ACCC Raises Consumer Spending



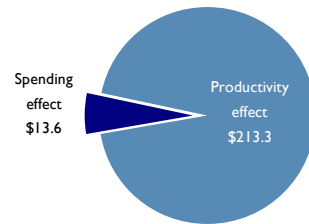
- ACCC employed 266 full-time and 151 part-time faculty and staff during FY 2006-07, with an annual payroll of \$15.3 million.
- ACCC had a total operating budget of \$27.4 million, of which \$18.6 million (or 68%) was spent in the service area.
- Approximately 11% of ACCC’s student body came from outside the service area. These students generated an estimated \$1.4 million in local sales while attending ACCC.

ACCC Stimulates Economic Growth

- ACCC spending for supplies and services and the expenditures of out-of-area students in FY 2006-07 generated a net impact of \$13.6 million in added income in the economy.
- The increased productivity of area workers due to the accumulation of past and present ACCC skills in the workforce contributed approximately \$213.3 million in added income in FY 2006-07.

Income Growth Due to ACCC

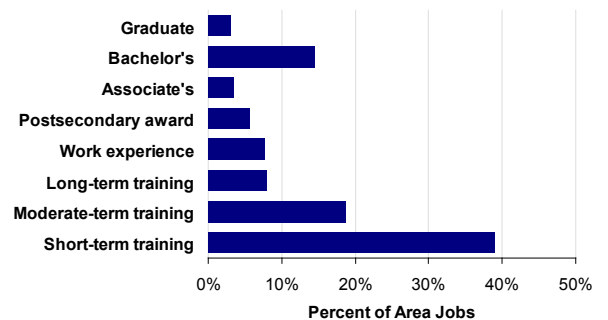
(amounts in millions)



ACCC Creates a Skilled Workforce

- ACCC activities encourage new business, assist existing business, and create long-term economic growth. The college enhances worker skills and provides customized training to local business and industry.
- It is estimated that in FY 2006-07 the ACCC Service Area workforce embodied about 607,400 credit hours of past and present ACCC training. These added skills promote business productivity and increase income in the area.
